The group had a wonderful and varied program of bluegrass music, as usual. The members of the group were: Bob Hartman, mandolin and vocals; David Leach, guitar and vocals; Bob Snyder, guitar and vocals; Alex Hairgrove, guitar and vocals; Steve Holley, dobro and vocals; Tom Joyce, percussion on the cahon and harmonica; Jerry Kelleher, bass; and our own Jennis Horn on vocals.

David Leach and the band led off with a Fernando Ortego song entitled <u>This Good Day</u>. Then Jennis joined the band to sing a love song, <u>More Like a River</u>. Alex led next with a real down-home song entitled <u>A Simple Life</u>.

The guys did three songs about our lives (and deaths) as followers of Jesus. Bob Snyder sang Ain't No Grave (can hold my body down). Jennis joined the band for her second song, <u>These Days</u>, a song written by 17-year-old Jackson Brown and on the theme of living life one day at a time.

Following Jennis' song, the entire ICS kindergarten joined us to sing a wonderful song about the days of creation. It is so great to see that Immanuel Christian School teaches biblical turth as early as kindergarten. After the kids sang, they spread throughout the room to greet us.

October 17th Luncheon - Attitude of Gratitude with Pastor Steve Holley by Gary Holmberg

On Friday, October 17th, we had our monthly Grand Life luncheon with a focus on gratitude. Steve Holley, Immanuel's Pastor for Seniors, led off with a devotional on gratitude. He led us through 1 Thessalonians 5:16-17 in which Paul exhorts us to be thankful in all circumstances.

He then listed several observations on being thankful:

- Spurgeon: "When we thank God for miseries, they end."
- "God, I trust you in the worst of times."
- We need to take our focus off of this world and focus on the next.
- We can always give thanks because we know Him.
- When our hearts are full, we change.
- Lincoln proclaimed a day of Thanksgiving in the midst of the Civil War.
- We need to demonstrate gratitude: notes, service, donations.
- In Rev. 7:12 we see gratitude in Heaven. It results in worship of God forever and forever.
- Giving thanks is a command, not an option.
- AW Tozer: "A thankful heart can't be cynical. It's too busy counting blessings."

After Steve's excellent devotional, a group of ICS kindergartners joined us. They sang Psalm 100 and distributed flowers to us. Jennis gave us paper to write down a list of things for which we are grateful. Then we shared around our tables. It was a great reminder to count our blessings frequently, not just once a year.

Then a final blessing for which to be thankful: Hannah's kitchen had a delicious lunch for us—some wonderful bread, a pesto chicken pasta dish, delicious green salad with lots of bleu cheese, and cake with butterscotch frosting for dessert.





November 21st Luncheon - Fraud and Scam Prevention

Officer Bayron Gudiel Reneau visited with Grand Life today to talk about scam and fraud prevention. As a Crime Prevention Officer, he serves in many capacities for Fairfax County Police. Occasionally, you can also spot him on duty at Immanuel Christian School as one of the dedicated safety patrols for the school children.

Officer Gudiel provided a wealth of information related to identify scams, detecting fraud, and steps to take to prevent it from happening to you or someone you know. He informed us that about \$12.5 billion is lost to financial fraud in 2024 alone in the U.S.


Some warning signs he provided included request for payment via gift card or money transfers, or cashier's checks. Any entity calling, texting, or emailing you completely umprompted should be treated with suspicion. Legitimate banks, companies, and organizations always mail a letter and will not contact you via phone. There's also a pressure to answer, respond or pay immediately to avoid stronger penalties.

Especially with the holidays, we encourage you to be wary of voice phishing scams where someone calls you posing as a child, grandchild, or other family member that is in desperate need of cash to get out of jail, get on a bus from out of town, etc.

Officer Gudiel encouraged everyone to always stay calm and verify everything before you take any financial steps. One thing you can do is run a Google search of the phone number contacting you. Always screen your phone calls (you don't have to answer!) and let them leave a voicemail. A scammer will not leave voicemail, but an automated machine may. Either way, you'll know you didn't miss anything important! Another good trick is to answer the phone by **not** saying "hello", which confuses automated scam bots. If you get a call about a family member in distress, verify directly with that family member first by calling them directly. If you cannot get a hold of them, contact someone else that would know where that person should be.

With all technology, be wise about how much information you give to someone you have not met face-to-face. Visit the bank during the day and avoid telling the teller out loud the amount you'd like deposited/cashed out. Write it on paper instead.
