BOOK REVIEW

GROWING TOGETHER: TAKING MENTORING BEYOND SMALL TALK AND PRAYER REQUESTS

This year marks my eighth year of involvement with Immanuel's Spiritual Mentoring Ministry for women.

I began as a mentee, have been a mentor to four beautiful younger women, and have been on the leadership team in several capacities over the past few years until I found my sweet spot as a mentee coordinator.

Melissa Kruger's book, "Growing Together," came out in 2020 and I'm eager to read almost anything she writes, and I was especially excited about this book because I know mentoring is near and dear to her heart, so I was confident she would have practical wisdom that would make me a better mentor.

Melissa's focus in the book is not on why we should mentor or be mentored—she points you to "Spiritual Mothering" by Susan Hunt, who does a beautiful job of making the case for mentoring—but instead her focus is how to promote life-giving discussions on a variety of topics that allows for mutual edification.

We have always encouraged our mentees and mentors to lead with vulnerability, but when you are first getting to know each other or beginning to share on a deeper level, it can be awkward to navigate what to ask about and what to share. Melissa shares her wisdom on how to foster relationships with God, the church, and the world, and then concludes each chapter with questions that get to the heart of the others' faith journey. I have found the questions to be the best part and what I most look forward to diving into when I meet with my mentee.

She does a beautiful job of putting practical advice in the hands of women who want to live 1 Corinthians 11:1: "Follow me as I follow the example of Christ."

Whether you are a part of the formal mentoring ministry or not, I encourage you to invite a woman a little ahead or a little behind in her spiritual journey to read through this book together and watch how God knits you closer together and closer to Him in the process.





grew up in a happy Christian home and attended church at IBC when there used to be trailers and no glass breezeway. I used to have to cut through where the ushers stand in order to get to my Sunday school trailer. I fought my mom most Sundays. I was shy in Sunday school and all the other kids seemed to know each other. (And the scratchy polka dot tights didn't help... sorry mom.)

Even though I was a shy Sunday school attender, I did learn about Jesus, and I did ask him into my heart at an early age. However, I didn't have the relationship that I needed.

When I was old enough to make my own decisions, I made them foolishly. I took lessons for how to live life from "the world," not from the Bible lessons from Sunday school. But what the world had deemed as the right way to live didn't end up being true. As I grew, although I was given a good foundation, I didn't see the importance of having God in my life. I grew into a rebellious teenager, then a rebellious adult, and the faith I once had seemed more and more foreign.

After years of running my own life, I had had enough. In my story, it came to the point where God was the only option.

I prayed sitting in my cubicle at work feeling scared, upset, and lost, and God showed me mercy. I asked not just for forgiveness, but that Jesus would be my Lord. And when I went to the Word of God to learn what is right, I realized how wrong I had been.

- EPHESIANS 2:1



I attended a recovery program, and I would read the Bible all the time. I joined Bible studies, went to church, and just tried to soak in everything I could. Sobriety changed my life and I have received healing. There has been healing in my family as well, and this new life feels very abundant.

I continue to "grow up" and mature as a believer.

I feel like I do it so imperfectly. If the Lord were sitting in front of me, I think I would ask Him, "You called me? Are You sure?" 
Then it happened.

She told the whole story of God's plan for the world through Jesus from Genesis through Revelation that started simply but by the time she was finished, there were tears streaming down my face and I wanted to jump to my feet in worship (and those of you who know me can confirm I am not a jump-to-my-feet kind of gal!) It was thrilling.

It reminds me of the Scripture passage in Luke 24 where two men are walking along a road and a resurrected Jesus joins them (they do not recognize him). Jesus asks what all the hubbub is about – and the men are astonished that he does not know what has been happening in and around Jerusalem all week! They are discouraged. Sad. Scared. They tell this uninformed stranger all about the powerful in word and deed Prophet that the chief priests and rulers handed over to be executed and how they had hoped he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. Then Luke 24:27 says Jesus, beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, explains to them what was said in ALL the Scriptures about Himself. From the beginning to the end! Later, when their eyes were finally opened and they realized the stranger was Jesus, they asked each other "weren't our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?"
